View from the Great Lakes State Brett Pharo, APSA President



Parasite Resistance

2018 was the final year of a three year project undertaken by the APSA, and partially financed by a grant from ASI's Let's Grow Initiative, to identify animals with genetic resistance to parasites. The program was available to all members of the APSA. Fifteen APSA member flocks participated in the project, collecting and submitting fecal samples from 2009 animals in the three years of the program.

Participating producers also collected blood cards on all sires of the lambs sampled. These blood cards are being stored at NDSU for future use in genomic studies.

Parasites are a serious problem in many parts of the United States. With the increasing ineffectiveness of existing anthelmintics, the ability to identify sheep with a genetic potential for resistance to parasites is a very useful additional selction tool. This is particularly true in the eastern half of the U.S. It has been reported that at the 2018 Eastern NSIP Sale in Wooster, rams with proven EBVs for parasite resistance averaged \$180 per head more than their counterparts without that data. Producers that participated in the grant program, and also those that didn't, are encouraged to continue to pull fecal samples to strengthen and broaden the data on indentifying genetically resistant lines within the Polypay breed. Also, please submit as many blood cards as you can to Dr. Chris Schauer at NDSU for future genomic studies..

Below are brief resumes of the candidates for the APSA Board of Directors

John Anderson

I am a current member of the Board of Directors and also the Secretary.

We have had Polypays since 1988 and currently have around 120 ewes. Over the years we have lambed on the STAR system and then moved to lambing 3X a year. Currently we are moving most of the flock to fall lambing with a smaller spring lambing.

With the wide genetic base of the Polypay breed we have a very versatile maternal breed of sheep, arguably the most versatile in the country. We should continue to promote Polypays across all sections of the commercial industry and consider ways to improve the marketing of this breed for our membership.

Kathy Ewert

My name is Kathy Ewert and I have been involved in raising Polypay sheep since 1994. I am also a veterinarian. Over the course of my 35+-year veterinary career, I worked as a large animal practitioner, was a resident and, subsequently a clinician at several universities, and worked in research and development in the veterinary pharmaceutical industry. In 2008, I retired from my pharmaceutical career as Director of Research and Development and redirected my focus to our flock of Polypay sheep. Since 2008, I have grown the flock to about 75 ewes and have had the pleasure of raising Polypay sheep as a full-time endeavor. We have an accelerated flock and expect our ewes to lamb every 7-9 months, so there is always something to do. We have a closed, high health status flock, have achieved Export Monitored Status in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program, and are USDA licensed. In addition to sheep, we raise our own hay, have 100 laying hens, a few Red Angus cows, and waaay too many horses.

I have always believed that the Polypay breed can be integral in moving the sheep industry forward and would like to do what I can to promote the Polypay breed. To that end, I would appreciate your consideration of me for a second term on the APSA Board of Directors.

Bryce Freking

My wife Bobbi Jo, our three children, and I own and operate Freking Polypay Genetics in south central MN. We have been raising Polypays since 2011 with a focus on genetics that can go out and perform for the commercial producer. In 2015 we joined forces with Anthony Henke to form Performance Polypay Genetics in which we share 13 sire lines between our two families, to create better accuracy in our performance data as well as better utilize our genetics. This also gives another perspective on how our genetics perform in another climate and management system.

I am the current APSA Vice-President and have helped with several major undertakings with this board in that time. I have a passion for Polypays that is apparent with anyone I meet. I would appreciate your consideration, and opportunity if given to continue serving this great breed and all of its members.
